The son of Rev. and Mrs. Ralph L. Minker of Ferris school, Lt. Minker before entering the AAF in November, 1942, was a student at Dickinson college at Carlisle, Pa. He received his pilot's wings in March of last year, at Pecos, Texas.

Minker Completes His 35 Missions

Writes Family Not Taking 2 Month Leave: Returning to Combat

Lt. Ralph L. Minker Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Minker of the Ferris Industrial school, has completed his required 35 missions over Germany, from his Eighth Air Force base in England.

In a letter received yesterday morning by his parents, Lt. Minker said that he will receive a two-month leave which he plans to spend in England in further combat operations.

The letter, written from a rest home in England on March 5, said he expected to be home on July 4.

Three From State Promoted in Army

Three Delaware Army officers, two in the Air Forces and the other in the Quartermaster Corps, have been promoted. They are:

Capt. Ralph L. Minker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph L. Minker, Sr. of Brindley Road; Capt T. Downham Weldon, son of Mrs Anna Downham Weldon of Alopocas and Lieutenant Col Walter L Tindall, Jr., husband of Mrs. Margaret Lynam of Gordon Heights.

By coincidence, the two new air captains are sons of school heads in this locality. Mr Minker, being superintendent of Ferris School for Boys, while Mrs. Weldon is principal of Yorklyn School. Both young men are B-17 pilots with more than 30 missions to their credit.

Captain Minker, based with the Eighth Air Force in England, has been overseas since last October, serving with the 447th Bomb Group of the Third Bombardment Division. He has been on one special flight in his 37 missions.

Captain Minker, who christened his fortreess the "Blue Hen Chick," in honor of the famous Delaware regiment of the Revolutionary War, has seen action over the Rhineland, Ardennes and central Germany and has been awarded the Air Medal and five Oak Leaf Clusters. In his last letter home he said he hoped to be back soon.
