After we left you daddy drove to the Hotel duPont where he picked up a Mrs. Kennedy from Washington, one of Mr. Baker's friends. Driving out we spoke of you, of course, and she told us that her sister was married to an instructor of B-17's at Tampa. Daddy was to get his name but forgot to do so. She, however, said she would write to her sister and tell her about you. It is a peculiar name so I do not remember it. He graduated from West Point two years ago and I think they have been in Tampa for a year or more. I suppose you will be meeting up with him.

Daddy went to the Blue Rocks game last night but I just stayed home and tried to relax and cool off. The girls went to Brandywiners.
